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Preamble:

This Diploma is a bridge programme for those who wish to pursue the M.A. (Ancient Indian History, Culture and Archaeology) later. It is also open to those who seek an introduction to ancient Indian culture, particularly through the medium of archaeology and literature. The programme is an intensive one, with students required to take three courses of 2 credits each semester.

The first semester is common to the Diploma in Buddhist Studies, and introduces students to the pre-Buddhist historical context, development of religious thought and the cultural interactions that have shaped Indian civilisation, through the medium of art, narratives and records of pilgrims and travellers. In the second semester, students engage with principles of archaeology, an overview of classical Indian literature and the historical context up to 500 A.D.

Course Objectives

This course will investigate the idea(s) of India in the ancient imagination, both native and foreign. What were the influences that shaped this civilisation and how did this culture-in-progress impact the world while itself undergoing transformation? How does understanding the ancient past help us live in the present?

Course Outcomes

Students would learn to critically interrogate history, to recognise the different forms of privilege - race, caste, gender, nationality, religion - that seep into a seemingly objective chronological recounting of facts. They would acquire the tools to critically engage with text and context through an understanding of notions of objectivity and subjectivity, hermeneutics and historiography.

Brahmi is the most widely used script in ancient India, and after the Indus script, is the most ancient. It has left its mark on not just Indian but Southeast Asian palaeography, as most modern scripts are derived from it. In addition, it was used extensively on inscriptions, making the knowledge of Brahmi indispensable for anyone interested in epigraphy.

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The workshop will introduce students to reading and writing the script, with demonstrations of how other scripts evolved from it. In addition, students will also read some inscriptions in different versions of Brahmi.
